Jews and the German nature under the Nazi regime – between belonging and exclusion (Public evening lecture)

Opening remarks: Prof. Dr. Kerstin Schoor

The lecture will present initial findings from a new study on the relationship of German Jews to German nature and land-scape (*Landschaft*)—as both physical and symbolic spaces—under the policies of discrimination and exclusion during the early years of the Nazi regime. This research proposes to examine German-Jewish history during the early years of the regime through the lens of environmental history.

The lecture will draw upon sources from German-Jewish press. The central issue I will explore using these sources is whether nature and the landscape continued to represent the German homeland (*Heimat*) for Jews after 1933, and how they clung to these concepts, or whether a change occurred as a result of the new political reality and how this change was reflected.

The research presented is based on collaboration with Prof. Ofer Ashkenazi and Dr. Hila Lavie.
